Top-Level Summary from All Conversations

State Civic Information

Attendees would like to be able to find candidate information, voting positions of Stratham representatives in the NH House and Senate, what bills are coming up for a vote or public comment, if Stratham's reps have a position, and what impact it will have on Strathamites.

Library Voter Information Night

Voter Information Night is valued, especially with the virtual option. This is the one event in Town that focuses on civic information for local elections, School Boards, and Town Meeting. In fact, the only criticism was how tough it is to cover everything in one event; people wish that there was more time for Q&A and to dig a little deeper into a few "hot" topics.

Basic Process Knowledge

There is a need for some "basics:" a Voter 101-type series, reaching more people to increase participation, and more video/remote access to meetings, events, and candidates.

<u>Unbiased Civic Information</u>

There are many obstacles to getting (and sometimes recognizing) neutral, unbiased information. Divisiveness in local politics is a growing concern.

TAKEAWAYS

What is missing?

- More detail about what Boards will be discussing and voting on enough ahead of time to participate!
- Summaries of meetings sooner (not minutes more reporting)
- NH legislative business
- Voting logistics: can register day of, how to register, voting absentee, how to file/run
- Explanation of form of government (new voters and residents not familiar with Town Meeting Form)

What is working?

- Voter Information Night
- Town website (for some things, but hard to find)
- Select Board newsletter
- Electronic signs (usually)

How do we get local information in general? Do you go to different places for different information?

- Select Board newsletter (Town events, trash pickup changes, Town Clerk/Tax notifications, local Town topics (PFAS), dog licensing)
- Library newsletter (events at library, reading recs, interesting news/articles)
- Subscriptions to agendas/minutes for various committees, boards (Town website)
- Newspaper (less and less)
- Electronic sign in Stratham Circle (immediate info)
- Schools (School Board info very hard to access!)
- Stratham Magazine (general local)
- Facebook / Stratham Talks [most of the group not on FB however] contractor or service recs, neighborhood happenings, what is being complained about.

What might improve what's working or make progress on what isn't?

- SB Newsletter working VERY well: (maybe add some of the things from below). Have the info about how to subscribe EVERYWHERE! Very visible. At Town Board meetings, anything public attends, Stratham Talks, every SB newsletter, Facebook (pinned post?), Town website in banner? Big button? Good insert in tax bill (see reach everyone below). Even involved people at this conversation didn't know about it.
- Voter Information Night working VERY well.
- Links to meeting calendar/agenda, committees/boards, library, etc. Centralized.
- Links with "teasers" Here's a topic at an upcoming meeting, here's a goal, public comment session coming up...
- HOW DO I KNOW IF I SHOULD CARE?
- THERE IS MORE INFORMATION THAN EVER BUT IT IS HARD TO FIND OR TOO MUCH
- "Town Hall" style event with Stratham's Reps and Senator. Maybe once/twice year. Also a written summary.
- Always have civic information meetings/events with a remote option. Also recorded.
- Why aren't public meetings live on a local access cable channel (like Exeter)? Or streamed online and/or recorded? VERY high interest for this group. Want information about how local access works? What would costs be? How does it work with Comcast.
- Some way to find out what other groups might be a source for civic/political info? (Stratham Dems, Republicans, EDI groups, other)
- Central location to find tools Citizens Count, local Dem/Rep, Who is my representative, etc. Does General Court publish an "easy" list of bills for the session?
- REACH EVERYONE: Stratham Magazine, bulk mail, inserts with tax bills, opt-out for SB newsletter instead of opt-in
- Make information gathering and distributing easier: ie: take a picture of calendar in Senior Room instead of typing out upcoming events for SB newsletter
- Centralized events calendar (separate from meeting calendar or combined...).
- Town Govt 101.
- Survey of voters after summary of this project: would you be interested in... Live meetings, mailed information, different communication channels, etc.
- Use Condo Associations to spread information and also provide feedback.
- Newspaper reporters at meetings, events even when no controversial topic. Would newspapers give Town some column space at least part of year?
- Need multiple communication channels for generational, cultural differences how to keep it all consistent?
- Town websites are very hard to navigate.

TAKEAWAYS

- Try to find out who is interested but not accessing/finding information?
- Use Stratham Magazine for civic info.
- Need State information too.

- Create visual pieces of information (calendar, infographics), accessible not only online.
- Broadcast and record/archive meetings.
- Need neutral, consistent, and meaningful info on candidates (including positions)

Comments:

- There needs to be more interest in politics. People need to pay more attention instead of saying "I don't know anything about what's happening."
- If you are active in Town, you can answer others' questions. If not, you aren't in the loop.
- I've been voting in Town since 1991. Surprised how many people don't know what's happening.
- If there are 1,700 people on SB newsletter, why only 50 at Town Meeting.
- There aren't reporters at meetings.
- There is more info than ever but maybe can't find it, or it is too much.

- Voter Information Night
- Select Board newsletter
- Voter Guide
- Newspaper
- Library
- NOT Facebook (want facts, not opinions)



Suggestions/ideas:

- SB Newsletter working VERY well: would like to see more links to follow whatever interests you. (ie: links to Planning Board, etc. IF the info on their pages is useful)
 - Links with "teasers" Here's a topic at an upcoming meeting, here's a goal, public comment session coming up...
 - o Put subscription info everywhere increase subscribers as much as possible.
 - o Could it somehow be opt-out instead?
- Voter Information Night working VERY well. Hybrid format is essential to reach more people.
- Civic chats? Discussions like this but a few times/year. Need to build interest first.
- Town Government 101 for new (and not so new) residents.
 - o How do I vote?
 - Switching party at primary
 - How to register
 - Absentee voting
 - What is the impact of attending deliberative session? Town meeting? Etc.
- Who is interested other than those with very strong opinions or agendas?
 - Don't need to reach everyone (which is impossible). We just need to get info to those who are interested but don't know how to access.
- Why aren't people interested?
 - o People don't see the connection between Town Gov't and everyday life.
 - Frame communications: here's how this impacts you. You have a say in how much it costs you.
 - O Visual materials: David's dollar, image showing "layers" of govt or connections
- Why was 2022 local elections 23% turnout when usually 10%?
- Voter Guide how can people access if not tech savvy?
- Voter Candidate guide: same questions and info from each candidate. From a neutral source. How to make available to all (not just online)?
- Use teasers/links on calendars too. One calendar with all govt "stuff" on it.
 - Could use a Google calendar and people could choose to filter by areas they are interested in.
- Links that would be useful everywhere: Public meeting calendar, Departments, Boards, Events --- Or those are places that should have links to important info.
 - o Trail Mgmt, SHS events, Car registration, Blood Drives, with Utility info
- Color coded Town/Civic Calendar @ end of Dec. Mail, Stratham Mag
- Meet the Town Planner; Meet the School Board Q/A sessions. What do people do?
- Fairness Funding Project, non-partisan funds for initiatives maybe
- Should be using Stratham Magazine
 - Get people together to brainstorm a year's worth of content, people volunteer to write. Lead time doesn't matter if it is Govt 101 or meet town staff.



- Blue Hawk Media broadcasts meetings (Exeter). Can they do Stratham too?
- Interested in connections instead of party (?I don't remember what this means)
- Need to have some communications targeted for generational and cultural differences.

Conversation #3 April 16, 2022 Attendance: 4

TAKEAWAYS

- Consistent, neutral candidate information beyond VIN (so brief).
- Link to all communication channels in one place.
- How does Gov't/School work in Stratham, NH.
- Develop targeted spots for communication and use consistently.
- Make getting info and participating easier.

As a local voter, what information do you want and need?

- Candidate Info. Names; what they are funning for; Their positions on local issues; Bio/background;
- When/where elections are happening

Where do we get local info in general?

- Neighbors, Friends
- State reps (availability?)
- People in Town
- Town staff
- Town website
- Seacoast Online editorials can be helpful but not consistently or intentionally balanced.
 And: paywall [LK: Can this be more accessible? Would SO work with us to make certain things available with login?]

What is hard to find or missing?

- Candidate profiles: Seacoast Online ones are behind paywall.
- State bills and votes; candidates; who are reps/senate/executive council
- How can I get involved without joining a board or committee?
- New, young, early, and mid-career voters need to know how to get involved.
 - They need to have info to see what they care about locally

Comments:

- Did not know that Voter Info Night is recorded/recording is available.
- There are so many channels. How to reach everyone?
- It is actually hard to participate and vote. Schedule of Town Meeting esp.
- So much information that is a lot on top of everything else we need to pay attention to.
- Systems are very complex those few who do understand it have more influence. This is NOT sustainable.
- How do we invite everyone in with the knowledge needed to participate AND make a difference?



- Concerns about educated voting (vs. "just showing up for ballot"). Other perceptions are that Stratham is actually very engaged and interested.
- Who is neutral?

Suggestions/ideas:

- Candidate info: the standard profiles that newspapers used to do but accessible to everyone.
 - Advance Voter Guide: 2 weeks before elections
 - Consistent format for each candidate
 - Give the questions to candidates when they file [LK: allowed?]
 - If a candidate doesn't respond or doesn't want to, still include them just with Name, position, town of residence
 - Could be an insert in a daily paper? Paid for by businesses?
- Stratham Magazine annual Voting Issue. Possible to do an insert to avoid problems with lead time?
- The electronic signs for election info are great.
- Use specific channels/places to target groups. Who do we want to reach? Where will they see this info?
 - SMS marquee
 - Town/Library web sites
 - Local groups (Rotary?)
 - Other places for signs?
- Make it easier to find subscription links (to get agendas/minutes, etc.) on web site better promotion that these are available.
 - Link to all other Town newsletters (incl library), social media at bottom.
 - Use QR codes on signs, etc. to the newsletter subscription.
 - Create a targeted info page for different interests include where to subscribe to updates. [LK: any way to sign up with a Board or department to get follow-ups on a particular issue? Maybe too complicated and time intensive]
- All newsletters have a standard format; identify most important info, be consistent.
- A few voter conversations scheduled per year? Make connections, build understanding, ask questions.
- At voter information night mention every position and person on the ballot.
- Bring information to where people are: soccer games, events (see QR code suggestion above). HOA, Developments, Neighborhoods.
 - Is there a way to measure engagement at different points? Know what efforts are most effective?
- State Gov't info needed:



- O How does State Gov't work?
- O Who are the reps for Stratham?
- O What is being discussed/voted on?
- Can reps have local "office hours" or town halls at the library?
- A visual representation of layers of gov't and what gets decided where
 - NH Stratham
 - School, Town, Co-op
 - o Elected, appointed

Conversation with Individual April 1, 2022 Attendance: 1

Post Town meeting in response to invitation to conversations

TAKEAWAYS

- Central, neutral presentation of candidate backgrounds and positions. [LK maybe would help condense presentations at VIN]
- Town Meeting remains a problem for timing, attendance. Different people want/need very different things.
- Town Staff is a huge benefit in making connections with voters and making experiences more accessible and pleasant.

As a local voter, what information do you want and need?

Candidate Info. More easily accessible, neutral

What is hard to find or missing?

- Candidate info:
 - Fewer social connections = less word-of-mouth recommendations.
 - o Local newspaper is very limited and doesn't reach many people anymore.
 - Candidate or group-produced info is biased
 - Social media is unpredictable/"rabbit hole" and lots of people don't use.

Comments:

- VIN is great (esp hybrid) but not enough time to really get into answers and critical issues for candidates.
- VIN is doing warrant articles part fine.

Suggestions/ideas:

- Create expanded voter information platform.
 - o Place for each candidate to provide a bio as detailed or as cursory as they wish.
 - Longer-format place for each candidate to answer a longer list of questions that directly address key issues, without limits of time or characters/words.
- Time at VIN
 - Contested races: opposing candidates should address the questions back to back –
 esp important for Co-op races. For example hear 3 candidates for Brentwood seat
 answer the question, then the two Exeter candidates, etc.



o Instead of all co-op candidates at one table, maybe just competing candidates at one time – matches how we vote on ballot.

Town Meeting:

- CMS GREAT venue. A/V, seating
- Exellent presence/integration of Town staff "smiling faces, clear id cards, greeting at entrance and points on the way into auditorium." GREAT introducing them at beginning. And including not just department heads (Karen, Denise)
- o Recognitions of volunteers (Joe, Flossie) very good, but don't let them go too long.
- Saturday isn't as popular with people I know as Friday night. Some miss social events that used to happen after Town Meeting in evening. [LK: these gatherings were quite exclusive IMO]
- Powerpoint presentation had some errors and was hard to read certain slides. Don't want to damage credibility.
